Education & Training by Brother Secretary Tom Gordon

A Short History ...

About 1876, Brother E. B. Jones, a Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Kentucky, composed a ritual for a side Degree and called it the "Heroes of 76." Its innocent and enjoyable nature made it most popular with the Craft. A notice in the newspapers announcing a meeting of Heroes after the close of the Lodge always brought out a large attendance.

During the lifetime of Brother Jones, no one conferred the Degree but himself. Before his death, he gave a copy of the ritual to Brother Thomas J. Flournoy, a Past Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of Kentucky. After Brother Jones' death, many craftsmen insisted that Brother Flournoy revive the Degree. This Brother Flournoy did, conferring the Degree upon selected Masons of many states.

Brother Flournoy passed to the Great Beyond at Rockmart, Georgia, on September 5, 1925. Sometime before his death, he gave a copy of the ritual to Brother Colonel Christopher Van Deventer, his nephew, with authority to confer the Degree upon selected Masons.

Brother Van Deventer, an active Sojourner, considered that the National Sojourners was the logical organization for the custodianship of the ritual as it is most appropriate to our membership. The Degree was therefore instituted in Chicago Chapter in July 1922 and the first Camp organized there. In June 1923, George Washington Camp was instituted by Brother Van Deventer and several Heroes from Chicago.

Since that time, Camps have been organized in nearly all of the Chapters of National Sojourners and form an enjoyable part of the Chapter activities. The Degree has never been commercialized and its founders never intended that it should have any other purpose than to give enjoyment and innocent pleasure to Brother Masons and Sojourners. It has never had any initiation fee or dues. To receive and retain the Degree you must be a Master Mason and a Sojourner in good standing.

This month in military history April 1862

Pittsburg Landing, TN - Confederate forces composing the Army of the Mississippi under the command of General Albert S. Johnston launch a surprise attack against the Union Army of West Tennessee commanded by General Ulysses S. Grant.



To buy time as he hastily organized a defensive position around a small church called "Shiloh Meeting House" near the Tennessee River. Grant ordered some of his brigades to hold the outer perimeter at all costs. One such brigade, composed of the 9th, 12th and 15th Illinois Volunteer infantry regiments made a stand along a tree line beside a field soon to gain fame as the "Peach Orchard." For more than an hour this brigade blunted numerous Confederate attacks before finally being compelled to withdraw. Though it suffered heavy losses, their sacrifice allowed enough time for northern commanders to hold back the rebel attacks. With reinforcements arriving by steamboats the night of the 6th Grant went on the attack on the 7th. After a second day of bloody combat, Grant won a clear and decisive victory, the first major Union success of the war. He would continue to win victories until finally accepting the Confederate surrender at Appomattox in 1865. Grant, who early in the war served as a Brigadier General in the Illinois militia, was elected as 18th President of the United States in 1868.



Procedures for New Memberships Initiation Dates and Membership Dues/Fees

Applications with Dues/Fees, for New memberships into the Harrisburg Chapter #76 must be received by the Chapter Secretary before the monthly meeting the month prior to the month's meeting in which the candidate is to be Initiated into the National Sojourners.

Candidates seeking membership will be Initiated as New members at the Chapter meetings on April 11th and June 13th. Therefore, Applications with Dues/Fees of Candidates must be received by the Chapter Secretary prior to the monthly meetings of March 14th or May 9th.

The applications for membership will be voted upon by the Chapter members present at the March and May meetings. Candidates will not be Initiated as Members at the same meeting in which their Applications are received.

New Member's dues for the calendar year 2024 are \$68.00 for those Candidates being Initiated in the April 11th or June 13th meeting. Membership-In-Perpetuity in \$733.00.

Candidates for membership will again be Initiated at the November 14th meeting, so any applications after June need to be given to the Chapter Secretary before the monthly meeting of October 10th. Dues at that time will include the 2025 annual dues, so the application will then require a payment of \$92.00.

Distinguished Sojourners

Lt. Col. Joe Jackson, born on 14 March 1923, in Newnan, Georgia, was an avid model aircraft enthusiast in his youth. He enlisted in the Army Air Corps in March 1941, a few days after his 18th birthday, in hopes of learning more about aeronautics.

World War II: Nine months after he enlisted, the U.S. entered WW II and Jackson was assigned to serve as crew chief aboard a B-25 Mitchell bomber. As a testament to his early flight aptitude, he helped save his fellow crewman by assisting his aircraft's pilot during an engine fire. Soon after, Jackson successfully completed Aviation Cadet Training and became a commissioned officer. He flew P-40 Warhawks and P-63 Kingcobras throughout the war, and ended the war at the controls of a B-24 Liberator bomber aircraft.

Korea and early Cold War: During the late 1940s, Jackson returned to flying fighter aircraft. During the Korean War, he successfully flew 107 combat missions in the F-84 Thunderjet.

Vietnam: After completing a staff tour in Europe, Jackson was assigned to fly the C-123 Provider over South Vietnam during the Vietnam War. While he flew 298 combat missions, it was his rescue mission on 12 May 1968 during the Battle of Kham Duc that earned him the nation's highest award for military valor. On 16 January 1969, President Lyndon B. Johnson presented Jackson with the Medal of Honor at a White House ceremony. Also receiving the Medal of Honor that day was fellow Newnan native Stephen W. Pless, a Marine aviator who, like Jackson, had earned the decoration for an airborne rescue operation. Upon realizing that both Pless and Jackson were from the same small Georgia town, President Johnson quipped "there must be something in the water down in Newnan."
