Harrisburg Chapter #76 has a formal dress code for our meetings, which being a jacket and tie, with your Nametag and Sojourners Medal. This is the official dress at the Chapter meetings, much like the mandatory Masonic apron in the Blue Lodge. Only the Chapter's elected President may authorize a deviation from this dress code, collectively, or on a case-by-case basis. If your Nametag, Plastic Sleeve or Sojourners Medal become lost, broken, or worn, please see the Chapter Secretary to purchase replacements. Additionally, if you are a Member-In-Perpetuity (MIP) make sure you are wearing a silver star on your Sojourners Medal and if you are a MIP of multiple Chapters, you are authorized to wear multiple stars in a vertical row on your Sojourners Medal (up to four). For more guidance on wearing Sojourners medals, TitleBars, MIP stars, and neckbands, see the Chapter Secretary.

At Chapter meetings we are all Brothers, regardless of military or civilian rank, and should be addressed as "Brother (First Name or Last Name)" or their Masonic or Sojourner title such as "Worshipful Master" or "Brother President." Use common sense. We are a group of like-minded men who have commonality of background in military and/or Masonic experiences, sharing in good fellowship. Rotate beyond your usual dinner table Brothers and expand your close Masonic friendships.

The U.S. Navy regulations for 1818 were the first to prescribe a specific manner for rendering gun salutes (although gun salutes were in use before the regulations were written down). Those regulations required that "When the President shall visit a ship of the United States' Navy, he is to be saluted with 21 guns." It may be noted that twenty-one was the number of states in the Union at that time. For a time thereafter it became customary to offer a salute of one gun for each state in the Union, although in practice there was a great deal of variation in the number of guns actually used in a salute.

In addition to salutes offered to the President and heads of state, it was also a tradition in the U.S. Navy to render a "national salute" on 22 February (Washington's Birthday) and 4 July (the anniversary of the Declaration of Independence).

A 21 gun salute for the President and heads of state, Washington's Birthday, and the Fourth of July became the standard in the United States Navy with the issuance of new regulations on 24 May 1842. Those regulations laid out the specifics:

"When the President of the United States shall visit a vessel of the navy, he shall be received with the following honors: The yards shall be manned, all the officers shall be on deck in full uniform, the full guard shall be paraded and present arms, the music shall play a march, and a salute of twenty-one guns shall be fired. He shall receive the same honors when he leaves the ship."

"Upon the anniversary of the Declaration of Independence of the United States, the colors shall be hoisted at sunrise, and all the vessels of the navy shall, when in port, be dressed, and so continue until the colors are hauled down at sunset, if the state of the weather and other circumstances will allow it. At sunrise, at meridian, and at sunset, a salute of twenty-one guns shall be fired from every vessel in commission mounting six guns and upwards."

"On the twenty-second day of February, the anniversary of the birth of Washington, a salute of twenty-one guns shall be fired at meridian from every vessel of the navy in commission mounting six guns and upwards."

Today, the national salute of twenty-one guns is fired in honor of a national flag, the sovereign or chief of state of a foreign nation, a member of a reigning royal family, and the President, former Presidents, and the President-elect of the United States. It is also fired at noon of the day of the funeral of a President, former President, or President-elect, on Washington's Birthday, Presidents Day, and the Fourth of July. On Memorial Day, a salute of twenty-one minute guns is fired at noon while the flag is flown at half mast.

Proposed Donation and Gift Policy for Masonic Youth

DONATION AND GIFT POLICY FOR MASONIC YOUTH

Section 1. Purpose

The purpose of this policy is to establish a formal process for making donations to Masonic Youth organizations. This policy provides guidance when Harrisburg Chapter No. 76, National Sojourners, Inc. wishes to make donations to Masonic Youth organizations.

Section 2. Types of Donations

Designated donations mean those donations the Harrisburg Chapter No. 76 specifies for a particular Masonic Youth location, or purpose. Undesignated donations mean those donations that are given to the Masonic Youth for an unspecified use. Donations will be made in the form of a check issued by Harrisburg Chapter No. 76 Treasurer.

Section 3. Consistency with Harrisburg Chapter No. 76 Donations may be made when they have a purpose consistent with the Harrisburg Chapter No. 76 goals and objec-

Distinguished Sojourners

SFC Sammy L. Davis, USA (Ret) Medal of Honor Recipient enlisted in the United States Army from Indianapolis, Indiana, in 1965. In March 1967, Davis was sent to South Vietnam as a private first class, and was assigned to Battery C, 2nd Battalion, 4th Artillery Regiment, 9th Infantry Divi-



sion. On November 18, 1967, his unit at Firebase Cudgel (10.4198°N 105.991°E) west of Cai Lay, fell under machine gun fire and heavy mortar attack by an estimated three companies of Viet Cong from the 261st Viet Cong Main Force Battalion, which swarmed the area from the south and then west. Upon detecting an enemy position, Davis manned a machine gun to give his comrades covering fire so they could fire artillery in response. Davis was wounded, but ignored warnings to take cover, taking over the unit's

Section 4. Designated Donations

All donations to the Masonic Youth organization for consideration are based on the value of the donation as outlined below. Harrisburg Chapter No. 76 shall review all donation requests and determine if the benefits are warranted. The following points list the threshold amounts for donation.

A. Donations for Masonic Youth organization will be valued at least \$100 and voted on by the members.

B. Donations valued larger than \$100 must be reviewed by the Harrisburg Chapter No. 76 Executive Committee officers before bringing it to a vote before the members.

burning howitzer and firing several shells himself. He also disregarded his inability to swim due to a broken back, and crossed a river there on an air mattress to help rescue three wounded American soldiers. He ultimately found his way to another howitzer site to continue fighting the NVA attack until they fled. The battle lasted two hours. Davis was subsequently promoted to sergeant and received the Medal of Honor the following year from President Lyndon B. Johnson.[8] After he was presented the medal at the White house ceremony, Davis played "Oh Shenandoah" on his harmonica in memory of the men he served with in Vietnam. Davis retired in 1984 due to his war-time injuries.

In 1994, footage of his Medal of Honor award ceremony was used in the film Forrest Gump, with actor Tom Hanks' head superimposed over that of Davis.
