Military Burial Honors

We are all aware of the burial rights for Veterans at the various National Cemeteries across the nation. Our closest one being Fort Indiantown Gap National Cemetery. However, there is another option for burial available. This option does require more work to be done, however, with proper planning, this could be a invaluable option for those wanting this choice. The Navy's Burial at Sea Program enables families to provide for the final disposition of their service member's cremated or casketed remains as part of a special onboard ceremony. The Navy offers this service free of charge to eligible families, though families may not attend as the Navy performs the ceremony while the ship is training or deployed. This military funeral honor recognizes a service member or veteran's commitment and sacrifice to their country and provides comfort and gratitude to their families. The Navy performs an average of 1,500 cremated remains and 15 casketed remains per year. It performed 1251 burials at sea in 2021. Those eligible to be buried at sea by the Navy are:

- Active-duty service members.
- Honorably discharged retirees and veterans.
- U.S. civilian marine personnel of the Military Sealift Command.
- Dependent family members of active-duty personnel, retirees and veterans.

The United States Coast Guard has its own separate Burial-at-Sea program. The National Cemetery Administration can't perform this type of committal service. For information,

Meeting a Medal of Honor Recipient

In July 2018, I received a letter from the Scottish Rite Valley of Harrisburg, signed by fellow Sojourner, Bro. Dave Auchey, 33°, Secretary of the Valley of Harrisburg. He informed me that I had been selected to receive the Meritorious Service Award in Scottish Rite Freemasonry! Wow! I was shocked, honored and humbled. My thoughts went immediately to my late Grandfather, Bro. Charles Kurzenknabe who was honored with the same award in 1957, long before I was a Mason! I didn't know about his medal until many decades later when my father gave me the medal for safe keeping and told me the story. Dave's letter directed me to report to the Pennsylvania Council of Deliberation session on July 13, 2019, at the Valley Forge Casino in King of Prussia, PA. A long year passed, but finally my wife and I arrived at the Casino. Our instructions were to report to a luncheon, after we checked into the hotel.

As we navigated the hallways, I noticed a man in an Army uniform talking with another individual. I said to Barb, I know who the speaker will be tonight! It was Bro. / SFC Sammy Davis, 33°, U.S. Army retired, M.O.H. I recognized him from an article I had seen in an issue of the Northern Light, plus he was wearing the Medal of Honor! Bro. Davis is also a member of National Sojourners. I shook hands and spoke briefly with him. He was very hum-

ble and eager to chat with another brother. Barb took our picture, and he graciously autographed a copy of his book for me! That evening, when he spoke at dinner, the room was dead quiet. No one made a sound or checked their watches! His story was riveting! He earned the medal on Novem-



ber 18, 1967, while in an intense firefight with a superior enemy force at Fire Support Base Cudgel in the Mekong Delta, South Vietnam. Despite being critically wounded, he is credited with saving the lives of three of his comrades who were all seriously injured. He received the medal in a ceremony at the White House on November 11, 1968, from President Lyndon Johnson along with four other recipients. His book is "You Don't Lose 'til You Quit Trying" which I highly recommend. I will always remember the events of that day for many reasons and meeting Bro. Davis is just one.



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Distinguished Sojourners

Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd, Jr., U.S. Navy. Citations for Exploration in 1926: For distinguishing himself conspicuously by courage and intrepidity at the risk of his life, in demonstrating that it is possible for aircraft to travel in continuous flight from a now inhabited portion of the earth over the North Pole and return specialized in feats of exploration. He was a pioneering American




aviator, polar explorer, and organizer of polar logistics. Aircraft flights in which he served as a navigator and expedition leader crossed the Atlantic Ocean, a segment of the Arctic Ocean, and a segment of the Antarctic Plateau. Byrd claimed his expeditions had been the first to reach the North Pole and the South Pole by air. Byrd was born in Winchester, Virginia. He was a descendant of one of the First Families of Virginia. His ancestors include planter John Rolfe, and his wife Pocahontas, William Byrd II of Westover Plantation, who established Richmond, and Robert "King" Carter, a colonial governor. His brother was Governor of Virginia and U.S. Senator Harry F. Byrd; his father served as Speaker of the Virginia House of Delegates.

Military Awards: Admiral Byrd was one of the most highly decorated officers in the history of the U.S. Navy. His medals include the Medal of Honor, Navy Cross, Navy Distinguished Service Medal, Distinguished Flying Cross, the Silver Life Saving Medal, and all three Antarctic expedition medals. Byrd was one of only four American military officers in history entitled to wear a medal with their own image on it. As Byrd's image is on both the first and second Byrd Antarctic Expedition medals.

Masonic History: Byrd was an active Freemason. He became a member of Federal Lodge No. 1, Washington, D.C. on March 19, 1921 and affiliated with Kane Lodge No. 454, New York City, September 18, 1928. He founded First Antarctic Lodge No. 777. He was a member of National Sojourners Chapter No. 3 at Washington DC.
